From the Pastor

Happy New Year!

Derek Brown is an elementary school teacher in Phoenix, and he uses stories from CBS Evening News from their "On the Road" series to teach his students about compassion and kindness.

One of the stories from the series is about a secret Santa who would give away \$100 bills to random strangers at Christmas time. The kids decided they wanted to do it, so they raised \$8000 the first year. None of the funds came from the school – it was all raised by the kids.

In the video you can find here - https://bit.ly/4a2ao2P or https://cbsn.ws/3Phzqle -we see all sorts of young kids in red caps talking about their experience, alongside footage of them giving random strangers the \$100 bills. One kid with tears in her eyes said that it had changed her life, and another said "the joy is their gift to you." It's a wonderful video. And, of course, it is heartwarming.

Somehow, it seems to me, we have linked "heartwarming" with "corny" and we think of such things as the red cap kids as a thing to do that is "nice." The feeling we get from hearing such stories often doesn't last very long. Maybe without realizing it we consider it one very small act in a huge world full of sorrow and suffering.

Most of us have heard about Mr. Rogers' story from his childhood. Something terrible had happened and, as a child, he was worried, and his mother said to look for the helpers because there will always be helpers. In other contexts, as an adult, he clarified what that meant: as we grow and mature we become the helpers.

The impact of helping on the person helped is huge, because a real difference is made in their lives. The person helping also often experiences a change as well, as the kids point out. We receive the gift of joy when we help others.

So when we hear such stories we might take them in as

deeply as possible, so that we, even second- or third- hand, can receive the gift of joy that others experience. Being generous toward others in spirit or resources is powerfully Christ-like.

"Joy to the world!" we sing. Christ's birth, life, death, and resurrection are the bringing of joy to all creation, the promise to us and to all that we matter, that others matter, that plants and animals and the planet matter. That the joy of one and all matters. The psalmist writes about this in Psalm 98:

Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth; break forth into joyous song and sing praises. Sing praises to the Lord with the lyre, with the lyre and the sound of melody. With trumpets and the sound of the horn make a joyful noise before the King, the Lord. Let the sea roar, and all that fills it; the world and those who live in it. Let the floods clap their hands; let the hills sing together for joy...

I encourage you to read the whole psalm, because it contains the promise of God's love fulfilled: God "has remembered his steadfast love and faithfulness."

Which means we have been remembered by God.

I think this must have been something that the recipients of the \$100 bills must have experienced: being remembered. The kids might not have known their names ahead of time. But when those folks received the \$100 bill they realized someone had been thinking of them – and they knew nothing of it. And the someone who had been thinking of them was coming to them with a gift.

In this new year we might contemplate this: even acts or words that might not mean much to us can have a huge impact on someone else. I have a pastor friend who

received a thank you note the other day for something she didn't even remember doing over 15 years ago. But all that time it had meant the world to the person who sent the note.

Do you understand what power you have? Of course, we often do not know the power of what we do, but I think these kids in Phoenix have something to teach us. That doing even small acts of generosity and compassion with intention is something so real it cuts through despair to bring joy. That is power.

It is a tradition to think about our intentions for the new year. Your words and actions, the way you carry vourself, all matter to someone. You may not know who. The point, I think, is to shine, like Christ shines in the darkness, though the darkness has not overcome it. (John 1) Your intentions matter.

As followers of Christ, we bring the light of God's love with us. You may not know you shine. God does. And the people who bathe in that light of yours know it too. From Matthew 5:

"You are the light of the world. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven."

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit,

 - •Presbytery of Wabash Valley met at Central Presbyterian of Lafayette. We gathered for worship and work; a declaration of quorum was made. All were warmly welcomed by the Pastor, Wil Reinowski.
 - •New members of the Presbytery were received including Peter Wilkinson, who served our church in 1990. Twelve amendments to the Book of Order were discussed and voted on. All passed. Included is an Episcopal-Presbyterian Agreement on local sharing of Ministries. A lengthy discussion of paid administrative leave ensued, was passed and it is hoped that the wording will be clarified by the GA.
 - •An AC was approved for the Winamac church as they plan to close.
 - •New Leadership for the 2025 Presbytery was installed including a celebration of the transfer of leadership occurring.
 - •The retirement of Vicki Dreibelbis was celebrated with gifts and cake.
 - •Anne Chenoweth-Ruble will be the Administrative Director following Vicki's retirement.

For those who are depressed, we ask You to shower upon them the light of hope.


Dear Creator, You, the borderless sea of substance, we ask You to give to all the world that which we need most—Peace.
